A Study Collection of sherds has been prepared in the Nauplion Museum to form a base-line for pottery identification and to illustrate in tangible form the definitions of the pottery sequences from the Argolid which have been set forth in recent publications. The examples are taken from the sherd material left from pre-war excavations in the Argolid, the wooden trays of which were used for fuel during the war and which therefore is now without provenance. Only typical pieces have been selected. The series representing LH I to LH IIIC (arranged by the Mycenae staff) is now complete and the Early Helladic and Middle Helladic sections (arranged by Dr. D. H. French) will shortly be ready. Our thanks are due to the Ephor of the Argolid, Mrs. Deilaki, for her cooperation in this project.

Following the visit of Dr. O. P. T. K. Dickinson to Nauplion to assist the Mycenae staff prepare the LH I and II sections of this study collection, two important corrections to the Chart of Mycenaean Pottery may be made:

- 1) LH I B to be deleted from the chart as a separate period, and the material shown for this to be included in LH II A.
- 2) Globular cups with close stipple (FM 77:2) are no longer to be included in LH II B but first appear in LH III A1.

Dr. Dickinson will shortly be publishing the evidence for these changes in the ABSA and elsewhere.

If some item seems to offend or to ridicule, I ask your pardon, and hope that you can believe no ridicule was intended. But if you find the items under that rubric to be beneath the dignity of the science of mycénologie, or blown up with undue levity, you will have to continue to be as patient as may be.

Eleftheros Kosmos, 22 June 1972. Press conference of Aris Poulianatos, on behalf of the Anthropological Society of Greece, on the Petralona cave.
