Note from the Editors

Nestor readers may be interested to learn that an article in a recent issue of *The European* (Krushelnnycky, Askold (Moscow), "Soviets cling to art treasures," weekend March 29-31, 1991:2) reports that Schliemann's Trojan treasures were among the "vast stores of artefacts looted by the Red Army" at the end of World War II and are now secreted in the Soviet Union. Two art historians, Constantin Akinsha and Gregorii Kozlov, admit they have not seen the treasures themselves but "have spoken to people who have and whom we trust. We know they are in the Soviet Union." By making the results of their studies public they hope "to start a discussion which will finally return these treasures to the places where they belong." We thank Daniel Pullen for sending the clipping to *Nestor* and urge other readers to follow his example.

Past Conferences

A conference on Mycenaean Crete, "Table Ronde: La Crète Mycénienne" was held at the French School of Archaeology in Athens, March 26-28, 1991. Jan Driessen, co-organizer of the conference, reports that discussions were animated, especially concerning the date of the Knossos tablets and the recent discoveries of Linear B tablets at Khania. The most important points highlighted were:

1. The LM IIIB1 date of the Khania tablets, their contents and hand very much resembling Knossian documents, and the problems they pose for historical interpretation.
2. The high degree of Knossian influence during the LM II-IIIA1 period in the other regions of Crete, and which drops during LM IIIA2-B.
3. The LM IIIA2-B period on Crete, characterized by a high degree of regionalism, sees the establishment of major centres such as Hagia Triada, Malia, Khania, Kommos and Palaikastro, whereas uncertainty reigns as to the interpretation of the feeble evidence at Knossos outside the palace.
4. The Mycenaean influence on the island is very difficult to identify archaeologically even in LM IIIB. The process of acculturation is a very gradual one and only in certain examples was the Mycenaean influence explicit. Crete stayed largely Minoan.
5. The discussion about the date of the Knossos tablets remains alive. An additional difficulty is caused by the proposition that the unity of the Knossos archives should no longer be accepted.
