Marriage contract (*synchoresis*) April 15, 13 BC

(a) *Addressee* |² To Protarchos,

(b1) Party 1

³ from Thermion, the daughter of Apion, with as guardian ⁴ Apollonios, the son of Chaireas,

(b2) *Party 2* and from Apollonios, $|^5$ the son of Ptolemaios.

(c) Joint agreement about the fact of marriage

Thermion $|^6$ and Apollonios, the son of Ptolemaios, agree that they have come together $|^7$ with one another for a joint life,

(d) Agreement about the receipt of the dowry by the husband

and the same $|^{8}$ Apollonios, the son of Ptolemaios, agrees that he has received $|^{9}$ from Thermion in cash and not through a bank $|^{10}$ as a dowry: a pair of golden earrings $|^{11}$ (*weighing*) three quarters (5.25 grams) and ... silver drachmas.

(e1) Agreement about marital duties 1: on the husband's part

 $|^{12}$ (and) Apollonios, the son of Ptolemaios, agrees from now on $|^{13}$ to provide Thermion with all necessities $|^{14}$ and the clothing as is appropriate for a wedded wife $|^{15}$ in accordance with the means of his belongings and not $|^{16}$ to harm her nor to throw her out nor $|^{17}$ to abuse her nor to bring in another wife besides her $|^{18}$ or else to pay back the dowry immediately $|^{19}$ along with half as much again, while the right of execution (of the claim) belongs (to Thermion) $|^{20}$ from Apollonios, the son of Ptolemaios, himself $|^{21}$ and from all his belongings $|^{22}$ just as if by virtue a legal decision,

(e2) Agreement about marital duties 2: on the wife's part

and Thermion agrees $|^{23}$ to maintain the proper things for her husband $|^{24}$ and their joint life and not $|^{25}$ to be absent overnight nor for an entire day $|^{26}$ from the house without the permission of

Apollonios, $|^{27}$ the son of Ptolemaios, nor to destroy $|^{28}$ or damage the joint property $|^{29}$ nor to have intercourse with another man or else, if $|^{30}$ she has done any of these things and been found guilty, $|^{31}$ herself to be deprived of the dowry,

(f) Penalty clause

apart from the fact $|^{32}$ that the transgressing party is liable to $|^{33}$ the statutory penalty (to the state).
